Weather

On July 15th (appropriately St. Swithin's Day) about 50 people attended the rededication of George Symon's gravesite in Kensel Green Cemetery, West London. George Symon's (1838-1900) was the founder of what became known as the British Rainfall Organization and he was twice the President of the Royal Meteorological Society. His grave was restored by the society earlier in the year and handsome slate plaques were added to the existing grave-markers. The rededication ceremony was led by the Society's current President-Elect, Professor Tim Palmer F.R.S.

The British Rainfall Organisation was a network of 3,500 volunteers that recorded rainfall across Britain. This was the first network of its kind in the world and formed the basis, including averages, of today's rainfall observations in the U.K.

Less well known is Symon's search for more than 30 years for the elusive "thunderbolt". In Greek mythology a thunderbolt was a ferocious spear thrown by Zeus in anger. The legend of the thunderbolt later became that of hot rocks or stones discharged by powerful lightning strikes. They were said to give off smoke and smell of sulphur.

There maybe a scientific explanation for the legendary story thunderbolt. When lightning strikes sandy ground it can melt sand grains into remarkable tubes of glass that form a network somewhat like a tree's roots. These are called Fulgurites, and could have been mistaken for spears or rocks thrown down from thunderstorms.

Thanksgiving Is.

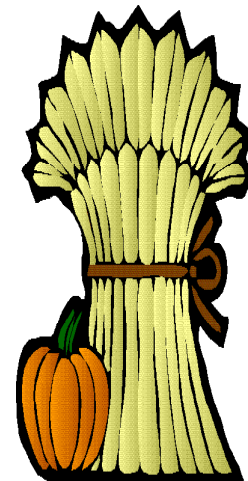


Thanksgiving is a time of gratitude to God, our Creator and Provider, whose guidance and care go before us... and whose love is with us forever.

Dear Friends,

I recently turned 34, and it is a sobering fact that I still have at least another 34 years before I retire. Reflecting back over the last 34 years and all the changes I have seen in those years, I am certain that there will be many changes in the church and the country over the next 34 years.

We live in a culture where the church seems to be increasingly marginalised and as reported in a recent BBC programme some reckon that the Church of Scotland will cease to exist in 2033. Therefore as, a young minister I am well aware that the church needs to remain strong in order to still be here well past 2033, especially as I won't retire until at least 2046.

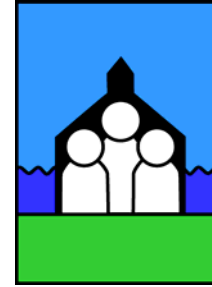
Therefore I am constantly aware that we need to build a church in this area, which is sustainable and developing. We cannot get complacent and expect the church to remain as it was in the past. In fact the Church of Scotland has always changed. 150 years ago most churches in it did not have an organ. 50 years ago no church in it had a woman minister or elder. These changes have been good for the church, and hopefully the changes that some of you may be uneasy about will also help the church to remain strong and welcoming to people of all ages.

That said, I do realise how important tradition is to many of you, and I do try to keep a balance in all that I do. One way that may help to keep the balance, is through the introduction of a traditional service on the first Wednesday of the month. Wednesday Worship will start at 11am and last about 30 minutes – 3 hymns, a prayer, a reading and a short sermon. The first of these services is on 6th October, with the second planned for the 3rd November. This is a new idea, and so all feedback will be appreciated.

Whatever the future holds for our church, I remain convinced that God will watch over and guide us. We are all part of God's family, and as the minister serving this church, I hope that you all know that I care for you, just as God cares for all of us.

May God bless you and keep you close to him forever.
