

Bush Fires in Australia

Robbie and Colin McNally received this firsthand account of the fires in Casterton, Victoria, Australia.

The situation within our State was horrific, a total of 181 have lost their lives. Over 700 homes have been destroyed to say nothing about sheds and outbuildings, public halls, golf clubs etc and other public utilities. The miles and miles of fencing, hundreds of motor vehicles, railway lines and really everything imaginable have been destroyed. The loss of sheep, cattle and wild life is colossal. These fires travel at between 35 and 50 miles per hour (particularly up hill) with a strong wind behind them. They create their own wind which swirls and creates "fire balls" which travel in front of the fire front and are projected up to four k.m ahead. Wherever they again touch ground another fire is immediately burning increasing rapidly in size. Dozens of people trying to escape in vehicles have been incinerated as the smoke is intense and the speed of the fire and change of wind direction can't be anticipated. Houses some distance well ahead of the "fire front" have been exploding into fire due to the radiant heat. The temperatures we have had over the last few weeks have to be experienced to understand. Hot northerly winds of about 90/100 k.m. per hour and the temperatures have ranged daily between the high 30's to as much as 47 degrees Celsius. Two small towns have just disappeared -- one by the name of Kinglake and the other Marysville. Some people escaped from them but as for the shops, homes, halls etc, there is nothing left.

Our thoughts and prayers are with those in Australia.

Before Christmas Mr Guthrie told us “God is real”, and just after New Year, Margaret Bean asked us what /who had been a great influence on our lives.



My personal answer to both of these came to me 20yrs ago. I had convinced myself I needed a new car. When I was half a mile down the road to the motor dealer, it was as though a sign was in the middle of the road saying “Road Closed” of course there wasn’t but something made me turn round and go home. After a short time I persuaded myself I was just “footering” and told myself to get on with it. After I had bought the new car , I found it to be a disappointment and to make things worse it was stolen two months later. So I rued the day when I had ignored that “sign” in the middle of the road.

I had often wondered how I would explain to others the realness of God and the incident provided me with an excellent and brief answer— “God Is in the signposts of life” whether we heed or ignore them is up to us. As far as my meteorological career was concerned, the first “signpost” was my brother’s interest in aircraft spotting. I too became quite good at this, but I also noticed other things —- clouds! Many other people set me in the right direction and in October 1958 joined the Met Office at Silloth in Cumberland where the officer in charge was Frank Walker who used to live in Girvan after his retirement.

After many other signposts I ended up in Ballantrae in December 1996. As a fitting reward for all my “weather” efforts, on the 4th of February 2009 I was told I could use F.R.Mets after my name (Fellow of the Royal Meteorological Society).
